Village 'Cake and Coffee Time' takes place each Tuesday 12 noon - 2.00pm and coincides with the Post Office 12.45 - 2.15pm. 59 Bus News

Commencing on **Wednesday 22nd January**, a change of route and timings of the Wednesday only service to and from Maidstone will be introduced by the operator, Nu-Venture. This is designed to improve the reliability of the service which has been badly affected by the seemingly never-ending road closures in the area, especially when Chartway Street is closed because there are very limited alternatives suitable for buses.

The service will now start from Kingswood and then serve Ulcombe and Grafty Green before continuing to Maidstone via Headcorn and the A274 (and Otham). It will no longer serve Chart Sutton and Boughton Monchelsea. The advantage for Grafty Green is a reduction in journey time of around ten minutes.

The bus will leave **Grafty Green** village at **09.56**, stopping in **Headcorn**, **Forge Lane junction**, (opposite Costcutter) at **10.05**, **Sutton Road (Morrisons) 10.26**, due to arrive in **Maidstone Town Centre** at **10.39**.

It returns from Maidstone, King Street stop L2 (outside of Greggs) at 12.45, <u>fifteen minutes earlier than previously</u>, and runs via the A274 to Sutton Road (opposite Morrisons) 12.57, Headcorn (Forge Lane junction) 13.18, and Grafty Green at 13.27, before proceeding on to Ulcombe and Kingswood.

The English National Concessionary Travel pass, available to anyone who has reached state pension age, can be used on the bus, and for those without a pass the return fare is £4-90.

As ever the message is very much <u>'USE IT OR LOSE IT'</u>, so you are encouraged to make good use of this service to help ensure it continues.

End of year article by Maidstone Borough Councillors Martin Round and Ziggy Trzebinski, Ward Members for Headcorn and Sutton Valence

Dear residents of Boughton Malherbe

To describe last year in short and simple terms with only potted summaries would be nigh impossible as Headcorn and Sutton Valence Ward is such a diverse and active area. The ward was large enough but became bigger with the addition of our friends at Sutton Valence earlier this year. Conversely the number of Borough Council Members is smaller. Seven less in fact. Combined with a move to four yearly elections from yearly, when a third of seats were decided, MBC has saved nearly £220,000. It does mean a lot more work and effort for all. Both Sutton Valence and Headcorn have grown in size with new homes, and with the 3 Parishes of East Sutton, Ulcombe and Boughton Malherbe/Grafty Green all add to the increase in workload. There has also been lots of population change, with many new people joining the community.

The early part of 2024 was taken up with the local elections in May, that resulted in a new Leadership of the Council by the Green Party, supported by some of the Liberal Democrats and some Independents. This has led to some inaction, as a large number of councillors were inexperienced. Hopefully the new councillors will start contributing to the council chamber soon. The Local elections were closely followed by the General Election. We spent a lot of time out and about talking to residents and noting the feedback, which we assure you is very important to us when we represent you in council.

As a result of some unexpected departures as a result of the electoral process, the originally intended "mayoral line" had to be reset. As a result, Headcorn and Sutton Valence Ward Member Martin Round was inaugurated as Deputy Mayor to assist John Perry from Staplehurst as Mayor. Martin hopes to serve as Mayor from May 2025. He has plenty of events, celebrations, anniversaries and special activities planned and to attend, particularly in our home Ward and Parish.

Many other issues call for our time and attention and the initial change of the Waste contract proved to be a massive challenge. Our Ward proved to be one of the more difficult to get right too and until December still was not 100%. For weeks Ziggy and Martin were out "bin checking" as reports of various problems were discovered and chasing for collections and generally trying to pressurise the council into developing a better service. Ziggy raised the issue at full council twice and we are hoping that by January all the problems will have been solved.

In the last year we have probably heard about more Housing issues than ever. We have been pro-active in sorting out problems of damp and other maintenance in a few residents' homes and have called into account the companies that are responsible for looking after them.

Planning for new homes and other developments is another area of our involvement and can always be controversial but that work must go on. Our Local Plan, which was agreed in April, defines the bulk of where housing goes. Whilst realising everywhere must have new housing we need to see some advantages to the increase in built up areas. We need improved infrastructure and services, especially in recreation and better/safer traffic flows and both of us are working with Parish Councils, developers and MBC to maximise the advantages that new developments can bring with them.

Two other areas of major concern to us have been the potholes and the water leaks, both of which lead to road closures, which sometimes are lengthy both in extra distance travelled, and time to complete the repairs. We have been lobbying the water companies as the many leaks are one major cause of the potholes and are now pleased to report that some dialogue is starting to take place.

At least one of us has attended all the Parish Council meetings, unless they have clashed with MBC meetings, and feel we have contributed positively and assisted to resolve some of the problems raised by residents.

Lastly we both wish you a prosperous and happy 2025.

The Grafty Gourmet

A great stew with an Italian twist. Simple and comforting on those cold Winter nights

CHICKEN ARRABBIATA STEW WITH PARMESAN DUMPLINGS

For the stew

2 tablespoons of olive oil 1 onion, thinly sliced 8 skinless and boneless chicken thighs, halved 2 large garlic cloves, crushed 1-1½ teaspoons of chilli flakes 4 tablespoons of sun-dried tomato pesto 250ml of chicken stock 2 x 400g cans of chopped tomatoes 5 thyme sprigs, tied 2 teaspoons of sugar ½ small bunch of parsley, finely chopped For the dumplings 80g of cold unsalted butter, cubed 150g of self- raising flour 80g of parmesan cheese, grated 50-60ml of milk

1. Heat the oil in a large shallow <u>casserole dish</u>. Fry the onion over a lowmedium heat for 7 minutes or until soft and turning translucent. Turn up the heat slightly, add the chicken and fry for 5 mins until beginning to brown around the edges. Tip the garlic and chilli into the casserole and fry for 1 minute. Stir through the pesto, pour in the stock and tomatoes, then add the thyme, sugar and some seasoning. Turn the heat to low and cover with a lid. Cook gently for 40 mins. Remove the thyme and check the seasoning.

2. Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan. To make the dumplings, put the butter and flour in a bowl with ½ teaspoon of salt, then rub the butter into the flour with your fingertips until it resembles fine breadcrumbs. Mix in 50g of the parmesan cheese and pour in 50ml of the milk, then swiftly combine with a cutlery knife until everything is well distributed and you have a soft dough (add more milk if it's too dry). Briefly bring the dough together on a worksurface, then divide into eight balls.

3. Arrange the dumplings over the stew, then scatter each with the remaining cheese. Put in the oven and bake, uncovered, for 25 minutes or until the dumplings are doubled in size and golden brown. Scatter over the parsley and serve.

Sue's Nature Notes

Speckled Wood butterfly

Brown wings with pale yellow spots - This butterfly spends most of its time low down amongst grasses feeding on tree sap, and aphid honeydew. They will also feed on the nectar of the cuckooflower, dandelions, privet, fleabane, bramble and ragwort.

Eggs are laid in the grass in a shady area with three broods a year. Caterpillars feed on a variety of grasses such as common couch, tor grass, meadow grasses etc.

On the domestic front, Alex has to have an LVA operation on her right arm to try to fix the lymphedema she suffers with following her breast cancer. The date is fixed for 24 December, and she won't be able to use her arm for at least two weeks! I am sure the family will rally round and not let her do anything over Christmas. Genevieve and Oscar will be there, but Toby and Naomi are in North America on their long overseas trip. They will be spending Christmas with Naomi's uncle in Houston. They are having a lovely time.

I am spending Christmas with Justin and Eve. They are having a houseful of people needing care – Eve's sister Tracey who need a lot of care, and Charlie and me! I feel guilty that I cannot help. Justin's household have the addition of a lovely golden retriever, Iris. She is still a puppy and very exuberant but lovely. My cat, Holly, continues to give me great pleasure and comfort. She is going back to her former owner for Christmas.

I am back, after a year, in my bedroom. The flood I had a year ago did a lot of damage and I had to move into one of the guest bedrooms! But I did not expect to be there for a whole year!





Christian Message January 2025

January. Christmas is over! Are you relieved, or sad? But is it over?

Well, in a way, it's not, because the traditional date to remember the Magi or wise teachers from the East visiting Mary, Joseph and Jesus is 6th January. This is sometimes called an epiphany (a revelation or showing from above) or, in the Orthodox Church, a theophany (a showing from God). The Biblical accounts of the birth of Jesus are anything but ordinary, but the visit of these wise teachers after his birth is remarkable in that it revealed Jesus as, not just another wonderful new-born baby, but as somebody extraordinarily special. Indeed, as the very earliest Christians pondered this moment, they realised that the message was that *God* had come to them in this otherwise ordinary human baby.

Whatever the scientific explanation, a "star" shows the wise teachers where to go. To quote some liturgy from the orthodox Church, "Using a great star as its mouth, heaven proclaims the presence on earth of him who has overwhelmingly become poor for our sake".

Gifts are given to Jesus. Frankincense was an expensive perfume associated with worship and proclaims Jesus as a priest. Gold was representative of ultimate wealth and proclaims Jesus as king. And myrrh, another expensive perfume, used at funerals, proclaims Jesus as the king *who will die*- for you and for me!

What on earth did Mary make of it all, as these wise dignitaries bowed before her tiny baby in the humble surroundings of a manger- an animal feeder?

And what do we make of it? Now that the twinkle of the Christmas lights fades away and we start our New Year diets to get rid of the goose fat, will we still bow before the tiny baby who was God made human? Will we still wonder at the grace of a God who comes *to* us to seek us out? Will we bring gifts? What about the greatest gift that we can bring: the gift of lives offered to a God who seeks love as a way of living?
