We have plans for just as soon as we can get a power source going in the Big Park and in the meantime, failing everything else, we will be dressing the two smaller trees by the Red Lion.

#### Memorial Garden update

We have completed the new grass garden planting scheme in the memorial garden which thankfully, has survived the summer in good shape and we hope that this will now provide us all with a changing display as the seasons move through.

It was a bit of a battle of the never ending weeds at one point but we did win and we can say that it has been a great and really rewarding project for the Parish Council to do. Although the ground itself belongs to North Northants Council, we are pleased to have been able to have had the chance to make this corner look a little bit more loved and will bring pleasure to all. # **CURRENTLY .....**

#### **Green Spaces**

Once again, this year has been tedious with North Northants Council with our green spaces in the village looking very poor for much of the time.

This is hugely disappointing and almost makes what service we do get virtually worthless as the mess that is left after a very long overdue cut sometimes looks less tidy than it did beforehand.

The Parish Council is all too aware of the dilemma that we have and has remonstrated repeatedly with NNC but we have not seen any improvement which is deeply frustrating as we are all left feeling that valuable resource is just being wasted. The Parish Council is committed to be looking at all options to achieve a better solution going forward.

### **Speeding Traffic**

You may have noticed over the last few years that we have a mobile speed monitor that we have been using at various locations in the village to map where we have speeding issues and to what extent. This is helping us to inform the discussions we have been having with Highways with regard to what measures we can secure to help reduce the problems that we have.

Unfortunately we have a legacy from when the bypass went in that has left us with the main route through the village being largely just as it was when it was the main road. This really should have been modified at the time to reflect the newly declassified road status and reduce traffic speeds but very regrettably, it wasn't.

Our data from the speed monitor indicates that traffic is moving through the village in parts at speeds well above the legal limit but it is no surprise to us all that we have a significant problem in Northampton Road with some really excessive speeds that we just don't want to see.

Broughton Parish Council will continue to update via this magazine and through parish council meetings/minutes on further progress on measures that Highways are proposing to help improve the speeding traffic.

# CURRENTLY .....

#### Still a Hot Topic

Everyone is asked to please always park throughout the Village with consideration for others. Broughton was built before cars came about and in places it really isn't straightforward in today's world of often multiple cars per household.

However, we have to work with what we have and sometimes things can be made a bit easier if we work together.

Firstly, if you have a driveway, please do use it as this can only help.

If you are parking on the road please take a moment to think if your parking could be causing someone else a problem – this can be for other vehicles eg are you obscuring visibility near a junction and equally for pedestrians – are you obscuring their visibility, not leaving enough room on the footpath for them to pass safely or making someone with a pram or wheelchair walk in the road.

As this is now a new school year a reminder please that parking on Cransley Hill at school drop off and pick up times is contentious and has been for a very long time. The appropriate road markings and signage are in place and all car drivers are requested to observe these at all times.

Many parents do walk their children to school but for some who are going on to work or who are travelling in to the village, walking obviously isn't practical and they need their vehicles.

For parents who are using their cars, please do whatever you can to park with consideration and with due regard for the safety of all children, pedestrians, residents and other vehicles.

Do not park irresponsibly or dangerously. If parking is not available immediately outside the school, please allow yourself a few minutes so that you can park a little bit further away and walk the remainder to the school itself.

#### **Local Election**

As we are issuing this newsletter, a snap local by-election has been announced to fill the vacancy that has arisen for our local North Northamptonshire Council (Burton/Broughton/Pytchley) representation. Former Councillor Chris Smith Haynes has retired from NNC due to ill-health, generating this vacancy. Election day is Thursday 10th October. Last day to register to vote is 25th September. Postal votes will start to be sent out from 25th September.

Candidate details were not available when we went to print.

#### Free Food in the Chapel

The Broughton bags 4 Good food table is available at the Chapel - please feel free to make use of this food - The Chapel is trying to help reduce food waste with the supermarkets by keeping these distributions open. Food Donations are very varied each time as it is simply what becomes available. The Food Table is open each Tuesday and Friday at 10am. Tea, coffee and a chat are also available!



# **CURRENTLY....**



Northamptonshire Police is relaunching its countywide Street Watch programme and is inviting local people to come together as volunteers to contribute to community safety and crime prevention in their neighbourhood.

Street Watch enables local people to take an active role in keeping their community safe by patrolling their local area as part of an organised scheme, identifying potential issues and engaging with local residents, encouraging them to report things like antisocial behaviour, vandalism and suspicious behaviour to the police. Volunteers are supported by a coordinator who liaises with team members and their local neighbourhood policing team to share information and help progress any initiatives that can help prevent crime and improve safety in their local area.

Volunteers are asked to spend a minimum of two hours a month, at times that suit them, patrolling with other scheme members in their local area.

Chief Inspector Dave Wakeman, explained that "Street Watch is based on a very simple idea – it's about going for a walk with your neighbours, getting to know people in the area, being a visible presence to help deter crime and anti-social behaviour and generally building up a greater sense of community spirit.




# **USEFUL INFO**

Poor rural bus networks cause isolation and push more people into difficulty or poverty. Community transport schemes across Northamptonshire help 1000's of people reach doctors and hospital appointments and take them to fetch groceries. 




# NOSTALGIA CORNER
