As the new academic year begins, we prepare to celebrate the life of our beautiful rural parish at our Harvest Thanksgiving, do come along to sing the well-loved harvest hymns. As we give thanks for what we have please remember those less fortunate by supporting the local food bank, there is a collection point in the church porch.

There are several ways to help maintain our church, the churchyard and the services. Many people join the working parties in the churchyard, the next is 14th September, or volunteer to read and take an active part in services but there is always room for more. If you are able to help with cleaning, providing a flower arrangement, would like to read or to discuss how your talents could help please contact one of the churchwardens.

Halam Parish Council Dog Fouling



Name & Shame - It's been done before and can be done again!

There have been several complaints about dog fouling in various parts of the village in recent months. This is regularly in the Churchyard, along the Turnpike and around the telephone box, on Back Lane and on the verge and in the gateway of Church Cottage on Back Lane.

The Parish Council would remind residents that it is an offence not to clear up after your dog and anyone caught can be fined up to $\pounds 1,000$.

Please make sure that all members of the family who walk dogs take the plastic 'doggie' bags out with them, collect the mess and either deposit the bags in the dog bins, if on route, or take them home and place in green bins.

Dog Bins

Parish councils are responsible for providing dog bins and Halam Parish Council has placed 3 on routes around the village.

Newark & Sherwood District Council are responsible for emptying the special dog bins and charge the Parish Council for doing so.

The Parish Council asks that residents do not fill the dog bins around the village with large carrier bags of mess collected from residential gardens; these should be well wrapped and placed in your green bin if you cannot create a 'dog loo' in your own garden.

Cleaning Up After Your Dog – advice from the Newark & Sherwood District Council

"This law applies to almost all areas in the open air to which the public have access. In Newark & Sherwood, dog wardens, police community support officers and others are authorised to give offenders an on-the-spot fine in the form of a fixed penalty notice".

The District Councillor has requested a dog warden will be asked to visit the area.

Open Meeting

A previous planning application was discussed, Cllr Rainbow informed the PC that his planning application may not go to committee, just passed by the planner

Clear porch cupboard – this has been done – next agenda to sort out how the storage will work for the PC and WI

Registration of Title – Mr Croston has all the information he needs to pass on to the person dealing with this

Ongoing work – the clerk is waiting for 3 quotes to be able to use them when we look at funding

Roads & Hedges

1. Road maintenance - awaiting more information, clerk to follow up with Highways

Please report major potholes to the County Council either online or by phone – the more complaints the C.C. receive, the more likely action may be to be taken.

2. Road signs on the crossroads need replacing – clerk to contact NCC

3.School Lane overhanging hedges owned by the Golf Course – clerk to contact them

4. Dog fouling in the village- the flyer to be attached to the Village News, also agreed that offenders should be named and shamed and remind them it could be a ± 1000 fine if caught. The PC are going to ask if we could have regular visits from the Community Support Officer who can fine people on the spot

Village Beacon

Agreed not to go ahead, we have looked into this before, and as we do not own any land, have nowhere to put one.

Quality Council Award

There are very few meetings during the summer but there has been one recent development.

Sadly, our Councillor Keith Melton who represents neighbouring villages on the Trent valley has been removed from the Cabinet by the Labour Leader. Liberal Democrats have had one seat on the eight-member Cabinet since May 2023. Keith said, "It seems to me that [the Labour Leader] has reacted badly to my attempts to push the Climate Change agenda and the restoration of nature "too hard" within the joint administration. It appears that the Labour Group on the council did not take kindly to my attempts to challenge the decision on developing land in the Lowfield Lane area [Balderton], by trying to organise a revision of the Arkwood [N&SDC's development company] plans from over 140 houses, down to a more sustainable level of about one third of that, preferably fewer than 45 houses."

Keith also said ""The area of Lowfield Lane has a significant segment of "species-rich grassland" and that is a designation of land that has already suffered huge losses of around 90% in the national context. The first rule of land development is that you should "do no harm" to the natural environment and that is not the case with the current NSDC and Arkwood Ltd plans for Lowfield Lane."

Karen and Peter will continue to press for all development in the village to be sensitive and responsive to local issues and improving our environment.

Cabinet meeting June 11

Last year's budget showed a surplus of three quarters of a million pounds that is transferred to the Council's reserves after a deficit was expected. Next year there will be a plan to redevelop the small units that are on the old Council Depot on Crew Lane Southwell, and an expansion of the CCTV. Discussion of land at Old Hall Farm Endingly is still being taken in secret.

The revised Customer Care strategy developed under Peter's leadership last year - where the officer that takes your call or email, will take responsibility for answering your enquiry, or make it clear what is going to happen, has begun to take effect. Any issues of this not being followed should be reported to us.

There will be a meeting of the Council on Sept 20 to agree the new Allocations Plan and Gypsy and Traveller Pitch Strategy. Issues for the area have already been seen by residents, and comments related on.

Anti-social behaviour in the towns is causing concern and so the Council is pitting more resources into this to reduce its impact.

Council meeting June 18

There was a petition asking the Council to consider providing some parking spaces without height restrictions for vehicles transporting multiple wheelchair users. This will be considered by the Cabinet. There was a discussion on how scrutiny of the Council's decisions should be improved, as was a proposal to develop a system for making local members more aware of matters in their own wards. We will report back on progress on this.

Planning Committee Aug 10

No local matters were referred to the Committee

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August is always a quiet month for committee meetings. The planning committee meets every month, we met on August 1st, where a planning application for an allocated site on Lower Kirklington Road, Southwell,



known as the Vineries.

The application for 45 houses was deferred owing to concerns around overlooking, size of houses and a lack of information, within the report, from the NSDC tree officer.

It is expected the application will be re-considered at the September meeting.

Kiddey stones

The administration of NSDC, Labour, Independents for Newark and the Liberal Democrats are all supportive of the plan to locate the Kiddey Stones outside Castle House.

Currently, the cost will be £81,240, although the cost may rise.

The $\pounds 81,240$ will be met from Council funds.

Robert Kiddey was a sculptor, born in Nottingham in 1900 with his work being displayed in the Royal Academy.

The Kiddey Stones comprise of 12 pieces of stone forming panels. The individual stones measure 2m in height and 1m in width and are carved sandstone.

The stones, property of Newark Town Council, have lain under tarpaulin for 40 years in Newark cemetery.

Members of the Cabinet, with the exception of Cllr Rhona Holloway (Conservative Group Leader), all voted in favour for the location and costs of the project.

As a member of the Policy, Performance, Improvement Committee, I submitted a Topic Request application that a working group consider and play an active part in the process of looking at the 'reach' of the public consultation and the extent of information shared within the document. The consultation period will start on September 2nd and last for the month.

The Consultation will be widely advertised through NSDC social media, online, local press and shared with clerks of Town and Parish Councils.

Please take part in the consultation and have your say on how your council tax should be spent!
